


DATA COLLECTION AND ANALYSIS

An effort was made to receive Student Satisfaction Survey from all students of the department. For this purpose, a google form was created and sent to students. As many as 53 responses have been received. In order to arrive to comprehensive results, useful statistical tools like percentage, etc. have been used. It was noticed that, 32.1% responses were given by 2nd semester students, 34% responses were recorded by 4th semester students and 34% response was given by 6th or final year students.








CHART-2: GENDER WISE CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENT RESPONDENTS




CHART-3: RESPONSES ON SYLLABUS COVERED

How well did the teachers prepare for the classes?




CHART-4: STUDENT RESPONSES ON TEACHER FOR THE CLASS




CHART-5: STUDENT RESPONSES ON COMMUNICATION LEVEL OF TEACHERS




CHART-6: STUDENT RESPONSES ON TEACHER'S APPROACH TO TEACHING




CHART-7: STUDENT RESPONSES ON FAIRNESS OF THE INTERNAL EVALUATION PROCESS BY THE TEACHERS




CHART-8: STUDENTS RESPONSES ON PERFORMANCE OF ASSIGNMENTS








CHART-11: STUDENT RESPONSES ON INSTITUTION FOR PROVIDING OPPORTUNITIES.




CHART-12: STUDENTS RESPONSES ON COURSE OUTCOME, PROGRAMME OUTCOMES




CHART-13 STUDENTS RESPONSES ON MENTOR.




CHART-14 STUDENT RESPONSES ON THE TEACHER IN EXPLAINING CONCEPTS




CHART-15 STUDENT RESPONSES ON TEACHER FOR PROVIDING RIGHT LEVEL OF CHALLENGES






CHART-17 STUDENT RESPONSES ON INSTITUTION




CHART-18 STUDENT RESPONSES ON TEACHER FOR APPLYING STUDENT CENTRIC METHOD








CHART-19 STUDENT RESPONSES ON TEACHER RELATED TO EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES




CHART-20 STUDENT RESPONSES ON TEACHER ON APPLICATION OF SKILLS




CHART-21 STUDENT RESPONSES ON USE OF ICT TOOLS BY THE TEACHER.




CHART-22 STUDENT RESPONSES ON OVERALL QUALITY OF TEACHING -LEARNING PROCESS IN THE INSTITUTION



Suggestions: On the basis of this analysis would like to put forward the following suggestions to the college authority vis-a -vis the Governing Body of the college.

(a) Since about 8% students have reported that they face some sort of ragging, proper steps should be taken to strengthen the Anti Ragging Cell of the college.

(b) The participation of students in NSS / NCC is not satisfactory. The NSS and NCC wings of the college need to encourage the students to participate in these activities.

(c) Laboratory facility for the science subjects should be fortified.

STUDENTS' FEEDBACK ANALYSIS REPORT (SESION 2018-2019)

Feedback from a total 734 number of students was received and analysed. Regarding the General Aspects of the college feedback was sought on a Yes/ No basis while in other queries it was on a 5 point scale (1 for low agreement to 5 for high agreement). The analysis of the feedback reveals the following.

- 90% of the students reported that they keep their parents informed about their academic progress. The rest 10% answered in the negative.
- 3. 6% of the students said that they faced ragging while 94% said they did not.
- 4. Almost 78% of the students participated in cultural activities in the college and elsewhere.
- 5. 90% of students participated in observation of days of National Importance.
- Only 85% of the respondents agree that the college carry out cleanliness drives.
- 7. A meagre 34% of the students actively participate in NSS/NCC programmes.

Due to Covid-19 pandemic, the college remained closed from May 2021 to September 2021.

A few students have submitted their feedback reports and we analysed their reports. A total of 239 forms were received from the students. Regarding the General Aspects of the college feedback was sought on a Yes/ No basis while in other queries it was on a 5 point scale (1 for low agreement to 5 for high agreement). The analysis of the feedback reveals the following.

- 3. 7.3% of the students said that they faced ragging while 92.7% said they did not.

- Only 96% of the respondents agree that the college carry out cleanliness drives.
- A meagre 31.3% of the students actively participate in NSS/NCC programmes.

SOCIETIES REGISTRATION ACT, XXI OF 1860 (some important provisions)

Sec. 4:-

Once in every, on or before the fourteenth day succeeding the day on which, according to the rules of the society, the annual general meeting of the Society is held, or, if the rules do not provide for an annual general meeting, in the month of January, a list shall be flied with the Registrar of societies, of the names, addresses and occupations of the Governors, Council, Directors, Committee, or other governing body then entrusted with the management of the affairs of the society

Sec. 4(A) (1):-

Together with the list mentioned in Sec.4, there shall be sent to the Registrar of Societies a statement showing changes during the year to which the list relates in the personnel of governors, council, directors, committee or other governing body to whom the management of the affairs of the society is entrusted and also a copy of the rules of the society corrected upon date and certified to be a correct copy but not less then three of the members of governing body.

Sec.4 (A) (2):

A copy of every alteration made in the rules of the society, certified to be a correct copy by less than three members of the governing body, shall be sent to the Registrar of Societies within fifteen days of making such alteration

Sec. 4(B)(1):-

Within thirty days after the holding of every annual general meeting, there shall be filed with the Registrar of Societies a copy each of the balance-sheet and auditors report certified by the auditor under such section (2) of Sec. 5.A.

Sec.4(B)(2) :

If the President, Secretary or any other person authorized in this behalf by a resolution of the governing body of the society fails to comply with the provisions of sub-section (1) he shall be punishable with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

Sec. 5(A) (1):-

Every society shall keep at its registered office proper books of account in which shall be entered accurately - (a) All sums of money received and the source thereof and all sums of money expended by the society and the object or purpose for which such sums are expended; (b)The assets and liabilities of the society.

Sec.5(A) (2):

Every society shall have its account audited once every year by a duly qualified auditor and have a balance sheet prepared by him. The auditor shall also submit a report showing the exact sate of the financial affairs of the society. Three copies of the balance sheet and auditor's report shall be certified by the auditor.

Explanation:

A duty qualified auditor means chartered accountant within the meaning of the Chartered Accountants, Act, 1949 or a person approved by the Registrar of societies in this behalf.

Sec.5(A)(3) :-

If the President, Secretary or any other person authorized in this behalf by a resolution of the governing body of the society fails to comply with the provisions of sub-section(1) or sub-section (2) he shall be punishable with fine which may extend to twenty rupees for every day after the detection of the default during which the default continues.

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
